The Graduate Program did very well in the 2011 National Research Council rankings including:

1. The best academic placement rate of ALL CLASSICS programs (we get our students jobs!)
2. The best public university in the US for graduate work in any branch of Classics: we were no. 6 overall after Stanford, Columbia, Duke, Harvard, and Princeton (and outperformed the last two in research activity)

3. We offer competitive fellowship funding for up to seven years and unmatched resources for travel and the like
4. We provide more opportunities for fieldwork in Greece, Italy, and elsewhere than...most other places
5. Every year our graduate students win nationally competitive fellowships including Fulbright Scholarships, fellowships at the American School of Classical Studies at Athens, and other such year-long fellowships abroad
6. The world's largest Classics library is located right next to the graduate student study area (as are faculty offices and classrooms)
7. A faculty Pedagogy Mentor provides support and guidance for graduate instructors, and faculty provide workshops on professional development strategies like writing a CV or publishing
8. We provide rigorous training in the ancient languages and provide opportunities for collaboration on a great variety of projects in Cincinnati (including an international journal)
9. Our graduate student body and faculty are quite diverse, including representatives from twelve different nations
10. Cincinnati is a very affordable city. Most of our students can afford an apartment of their own...without roommates
